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indigenous sign systems such as pictographs petroglyphs hieroglyphs and khipu are usually understood as relics from an inaccessible past that is far from the truth however as edgar garcia makes clear in signs of the americas rather than being dead languages these sign systems have always been living evolving signifiers responsive to their circumstances and able to continuously redefine themselves and the nature of the world garcia tells the story of the present life of these sign systems examining the contemporary impact they have had on poetry prose visual art legal philosophy political activism and environmental thinking in doing so he brings together a wide range of indigenous and non indigenous authors and artists of the americas from aztec priests and amazonian shamans to simon ortiz gerald vizenor jaime de angulo charles olson cy twombly gloria anzald²/₂ william burroughs louise erdrich cecilia vicu²/₂ and many others from these sources garcia depicts the culture of a modern interconnected hemisphere revealing that while these signs of the americas have suffered expropriation misuse and mistranslation they have also created their own systems of knowing and being these indigenous systems help us to rethink categories of race gender nationalism and history producing a new way of thinking about our interconnected hemisphere this ambitious energizing book redefines what constitutes a world in world literature

this book chronicles the dawn of the global movement for women s rights in the first decades of the twentieth century the founding mothers of this movement were not based primarily in the united states however or in europe instead katherine m marino introduces readers to a cast of remarkable latin american and caribbean women whose deep friendships and intense rivalries forged global feminism out of an era of imperialism racism and fascism six dynamic activists form the heart of this story from brazil bertha lutz from cuba ofelia dom Ingez navarro from uruguay paulina luisi from panama clara gonzzlez from chile marta vergara and from the united states doris stevens this pan american network drove a transnational movement that advocated women s suffrage equal pay for equal work maternity rights and broader self determination their painstaking efforts led to the enshrinement of women s rights in the united nations charter and the development of a framework for international human rights but their work also revealed deep divides with latin american activists overcoming u s presumptions to feminist superiority as marino shows these early fractures continue to influence divisions among today s activists along class racial and national lines marino s multinational and multilingual research yields a new narrative for the creation of global feminism the leading women introduced here were forerunners in understanding the power relations at the heart of international affairs their drive to enshrine fundamental rights for women children and all people of the world stands as a testament to what can be accomplished when global thinking meets local action

in this completely revised and updated edition of america and the americas lester d langley covers the long period from the colonial era into the twenty first century providing an interpretive introduction to the history of u s relations with latin america the caribbean and canada langley draws on the other books in the series to provide a more richly detailed and informed account of the role and place of the united states in the hemisphere in the process he explains how the united states in appropriating the values and symbolism identified with america has attained a special place in the minds and estimation of other hemispheric peoples discussing the formal structures and diplomatic postures underlying u s policy making langley examines the political economic and cultural currents that often have frustrated inter american progress and accord most important the greater attention given to u s relations with canada in this edition provides a broader and deeper understanding of the often controversial role of the nation in the hemisphere and particularly in north america commencing with the french british struggle for supremacy in north america in the french and indian war langley frames the story of the american experience in the western hemisphere through four distinct eras in the first era from the 1760s to the 1860s the fundamental character of u s policy in the hemisphere and american values about other nations and peoples of the americas took form in the second era from the 1870s to the 1930s the united states fashioned a continental and then a caribbean empire from the mid 1930s to the early 1960s the paramount issues of the inter american experience related to the global crisis in the final part of the book langley details the efforts of the united states to carry out its political and economic agenda in the hemisphere from the early 1960s to the onset of the twenty first century only to be frustrated by governments determined to follow an independent course over more than 250 years of encounter however the peoples of the americas have created human bonds and cultural exchanges that stand in sharp contrast to the formal and often conflictive hemisphere crafted by governments

privateers of the americas examines raids on spanish shipping conducted from the united states during the early 1800s these activities were sanctioned by and conducted on behalf of republics in spanish america aspiring to independence from spain among the available histories of privateering there is no comparable work because privateering further complicated international dealings during the already tumultuous age of revolution the book also offers a new perspective on the diplomatic and atlantic history of the early american republic seafarers living in the united states secured commissions from spanish american nations attacked spanish vessels and returned to sell their captured cargoes which sometimes included slaves from bases in baltimore new orleans and galveston and on amelia island privateers sold millions of dollars of goods to untold numbers of ordinary americans their collective enterprise involved more than a hundred vessels and thousands of people not only ships crews but investors merchants suppliers and others they angered foreign diplomats worried american officials and muddied u s foreign relations david head looks at how spanish american privateering worked and who engaged in it how the u s government responded how privateers and their supporters evaded or exploited laws and international relations what motivated men to choose this line of work and ultimately what it meant to them to sail for the new republics of spanish america his findings broaden our understanding of the experience of being an american in a wider world

in this pathbreaking new work vitor izecksohn attempts to shed new light on the american civil war by comparing it to a strikingly similar campaign in south america the war of the triple alliance of **1864 70** which galvanized four countries and became the longest large scale international conflict in the history of the americas like the union in its conflict with the confederacy brazil was faced with an enemy of inferior resources and manpower in their case paraguay that nonetheless proved extremely difficult to defeat in both cases the more powerful army had to create an elaborate war machine controlled by the central state to achieve victory while it was not the official cause of either conflict slavery weighed heavily on both wars when volunteers became scarce both the union and brazilian armies resorted to conscription and particularly in the case of the union army the enlistment of freedmen of african descent the consequences of the union s recruitment of african americans would extend beyond the war years contributing significantly to emancipation and reform in the defeated south taken together these two major powers experiences reveal much about state building army recruitment and the military and social impact of slavery the many parallels revealed by this book challenge the assumption that the american civil war was an exceptional conflict a nation divided studies in the civil war era

the american cordilleras form a continuous orogen that extends for 12 500 km along the eastern flank of the pacific ocean from arctic to antarctic latitudes as an integral part of the circum pacific orogenic

belt following two summary chapters on the overall anatomy and evolution of north and south american segments of the orogenic system this volume includes ten seminal chapters dealing with salient aspects of the key geodynamic processes that have accompanied cordilleran geotectonic evolution forearc terrane accretion arc magmatism shallow subduction and backarc intracontinental deformation the papers in this volume were selected from those presented at the 2006 backbone of the americas meeting which was sponsored jointly by multiple north and south american geological societies in mendoza argentina pub desc

langley examines the political and social tensions reverberating throughout british french and spanish america pointing out the characteristics that distinguished each unpheaval from the others the impact of place or location on the course of revolution the dynamics of race and color as well as class the relation between leaders and followers the strength of counterrevolutionary movements and especially the way that militarization of society during war affected the new governments in the postrevolutionary era langley argues that an understanding of the legacy of the revolutionary age sheds tremendous light on the political condition of the americas today virtually every modern political issue the relationship of the state to the individual the effectiveness of government the liberal promise for progress and the persistence of color as a critical dynamic in social policy was central to the earlier period

this book directly engages vital social justice issues of diaspora exclusion and resilience through an ethnographic study with the garifuna a central american afro indigenous group with roots in western africa and the caribbean today the garifuna are concentrated on the caribbean coast of honduras nicaragua guatemala and belize and about 50 000 garifuna live in the us the primary focus is the resilience of garifuna communities on the southeastern caribbean coast of nicaragua through an in depth study of garifuna commitment to community and place bolstered by interviews with recent garifuna migrants to the u s who keep their culture alive in the bronx and elsewhere through language food annual trips home and spiritual connection with their ancestors

for a long time most people believed that christopher columbus was the first explorer to discover america the first to make a successful round trip voyage across the atlantic but in recent years as new evidence has come to light our understanding of history has changed we know now that columbus was among the last explorers to reach the americas not the first jacket
